

Need a library card?

Freeborn County residents:

Anyone who lives in or owns property in Freeborn County is eligible for an Albert Lea Public Library card. Children 3-17 years old are eligible for a card with a completed application and proof of residence by a parent or guardian.

Minnesota residents outside of Freeborn County:

If you live in Minnesota but outside of Freeborn County, you are eligible to have your home library card activated so that you may use all of our non-digital services. If your current library is a member of the SELCO system, you are already eligible to use our non-digital services.

Non-Minnesota residents:

If you live outside of Minnesota, you can obtain a library card with an annual, non-refundable fee of \$40.

Enjoy our parks this winter! Neighborhood parks are open with outdoor skating rinks at Academy, Hawthorne, Hayek and Lakeview parks. Although Bancroft Bay and Edgewater parks are gated, they're open to snowshoeing, cross-country skiing and other winter fun.

The city removes snow from the Blue Zones Walkway around Fountain Lake and the "figure 8" of the Blazing Star Trail off Garfield Avenue so they remain open for pedestrians.

Snow removal: Keeping the community safe during winter weather

- City crews plow 120 miles of streets.
- Snow removal typically begins when there is 3 inches of snow accumulation or when drifting snow causes dangerous conditions that impact travel.
- The city prioritizes plowing arterial and collector streets, emergency vehicle locations, school streets and bus routes.
- Residential streets and city parking lots are plowed last.

Stay safe on the roads over the holidays and every day:

- Prepare your car for winter and keep an emergency kit with you.
- Get a good night's sleep before departing and avoid driving drowsy.
- Leave early, planning ahead for heavy traffic.
- Make sure every person in the vehicle is properly buckled up no matter how long or short the distance traveled.
- Put that cell phone away; many distractions occur while driving, but cell phones are the main culprit.
- Practice defensive driving.
- Designate a sober driver to ensure guests make it home safely after a holiday party; alcohol or over-thecounter, prescription and illegal drugs can cause impairment.



Protect our lakes: Reduce salt pollution

Salt, particularly chloride, poses a significant threat to Minnesota's freshwater ecosystems, harming aquatic life and potentially impacting drinking water sources. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) emphasizes that even a small amount of salt can have detrimental effects. A teaspoon of salt can permanently contaminate five gallons of water.

De-icing salt is a major contributor to salt pollution in Minnesota's lakes and streams. To minimize the use of salt and protect our waterways, the MPCA recommends the following practices:

- Shovel and scrape. Removing snow and ice manually reduces the amount of salt needed for melting.
- Use sand for traction. When temperatures drop below 15°F, salt loses its effectiveness. Instead, use sand to improve traction on sidewalks and driveways.
- Apply salt sparingly. A small amount of salt goes a long way. A coffee cup full of salt is sufficient to treat a 20-foot driveway or 1,000 square feet of sidewalk.
- Sweep up excess salt. Once salt has melted snow and ice, sweep up any visible salt on dry surfaces. This prevents salt from running off into local lakes.
