Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Steve Ball at 6:00pm.

Adopt Agenda:

Wende Taylor made the motion to approve the agenda for tonight's meeting with the addition of the Bayside Waterski Show Team community project request and Therese Salazar seconded the motion. The board voted in favor of said motion 6-0 (Tony Seguar was absent). Motion declared passed.

Approval of the Minutes:

Amy Leach made the motion to approve the minutes from the September 16, 2024 meeting and Whitney Sauer seconded the motion. The board voted in favor of said motion 6-0 (Tony Segura was absent). Motion declared passed.

Public Items:

Wende Taylor contacted staff regarding a community member question on the new rain garden area on the corner of The Fairway and Lake Shore Dr. The community member's backyard adjoins the land where the new garden is located. They had questions regarding how much water will sit in there and if there will be any fencing put up around the area. A member from the Engineering department will be calling the community member to answer their questions on this project.

Action/Discussion Items:

Review and discussion of Bayside Waterski Show Team community project request

- O Phil Wacholz and Mike Johnson from the Bayside Waterski Show Team presented to the board on their community project requested for their show site in Edgewater Bay on Fountain Lake. This site has been their show site for 54 years and the team currently uses the site 4 days a week for practices and their weekly show on Thursday evenings from June through Labor Day. They also host a 4th of July show and perform traveling shows in other communities.
- The team will be hosting the 2025 Regional Tournament in July and are looking to make some improvements to the shoreline and beach area to accommodate the large teams that will be participating.
- o In 2005 the concrete pillow was placed and in 2010 there was a revision to remove the middle portion of the pillow to accommodate a better beach area. The team is requesting permission to submit a revision to the current permit request to the DNR to remove all of the remaining concrete pillow and replace with beach. The team will fully fund this project, with Dulas Excavating doing the work, which will also include dirt work, restoration of grass and sediment control.
- O Ryan Hajek believes this is a great idea as the pillow is not serving it's original purpose. Amy Leach also agrees that this improvement would benefit the community with an additional beach area. Phil state he has already discussed this with the DNR and they are also excited to remove this as the pillow doesn't serve a purpose in wildlife habitat but the expanded sandy beach area would.
- There will be a \$1,200 permit fee through the DNR that the team will pay for. Once the permit is submitted there is a 30-day public comment period through the DNR. If the board approves this, Bayside will submit the permit and get going on work as soon as they are able to.
- Amy Leach motioned to approve the request by Bayside to submit a revised permit to the DNR to remove the concrete pillow and replace with extended sandy beach while preserving the shoreline. Kent Rahn seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the board voted in favor of said motion 7-0. Motion declared passed.

Update on facilities projects and designs

Recreation staff presented a visual walk through of the most current design of the
expanded lobby at the City Arena as well as the improvements at the Aquatic Center.
There are still some fine tuning to be done however staff feels very good with where
things are at in the process. Feedback from the board was positive.

Review and discussion of Albert Lea Youth Softball community project request

The Albert Lea Youth Softball Association submitted a community project request to place a 10' x 16' shed with vinyl siding and roll up overhead door at the Snyder Field

- complex. The shed is on skids and would be placed on a crushed gravel pad initially with future plans on possibly having a concrete slab. All funding will be provided by the association for the shed and the placement. This shed allows the association to keep their equipment on the site that is used for all their practices and games.
- Steve asked about preventing rodents from damaging items in the shed when stored out of season. There is no opposition from Parks staff. Jason asked if inspections needs to be involved and staff will confirm this prior to final approval.
- Therese Salazar made a motion to approve the project application for placement of the equipment shed as long as it meets City Code. Amy Leach seconded the motion. The board voted in favor of said motion 6-0 (Whitney Sauer was absent). Motion declared passed.

• Discuss and approve 2025 meeting dates

- The board discussed the need for any changes to the time of the meetings for 2025 to ensure everyone can get there. After a short discussion, it was decided to keep meeting times at 6pm on the 3rd Monday of the month for 2025

Bicycle shelter at Frank Hall Park:

The Freeborn County Trail Association has secured \$60,000 for the project with additional \$13,000 needed. The association continues to seeking grant and donations for the remainder.

Trail along the former UP railroad corridor: Excerpt from update from County Engineer Phil Wacholz

1. HDR has successfully been added as a subconsultant to perform design alternatives for the Highway 13 crossing. Our concern was that the difficulty in crossing Highway 13 would eat up

substantial design budget. Therefore, HDR contacted MnDOT and a MnDOT Consultant who was already working on similar work. HDR was able to be added as a subconsultant to this project and now a portion of the fees for work on our project will actually be paid by MnDOT. This will avoid us overrunning due to the design effort we are needing on the Highway 13 crossing.

- a. There will be three options evaluated for the crossing of Highway 13.
 - i. At grade crossing at the same location as the old RR crossing at Highway 13, and
 - ii. Grade separated crossing with the trail going under Highway 13 vie a tunnel, and
 - iii. At grade crossing of Highway 13 at the location of a new roundabout at Sunset Street.
- 2. As part of the Winter Avenue reconstruction, the City of Albert Lea installed the trail crossing ramps for Winter based on the preliminary design so that new curbing, sidewalk, and street wouldn't be disturbed in the future for the trail construction.
- 3. Environmental Memo is underway to describe the foreseeable environmental challenges the project will face.
 - a. Application for funding: County is moving ahead with an application for MnDOT's Active Transportation Infrastructure grant. The grant awards up to \$1 million in state funding per project and our trail is a great fit. This funding would be for 2025 or 2026 construction and if we were awarded the full amount it would fund approximately 30% of the project.
 - b. There are a few other funding opportunities with applications open in the spring. They are Regional Trail Grant from the MnDNR, Legislative Citizen Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCCMR), and MnDNR Federal Recreation Trails grant. As we have discussed, our project is going to require funding from a variety of sources and will also include the need for local inputs. For this phase of trail construction, the preliminary estimate was \$3.5 million. If we can get the project funded to about 75-80%, that would leave approximately \$875,000 in local money required. This could be split with the City of Albert Lea. Grant funding for 100% of the project is unlikely in my opinion. We currently have approximately \$600,000 in committed funds for trail design, construction, and maintenance.

Snyder Field Improvements (one of the Board's top 5 priorities): At its meeting on Jan. 13, the Albert Lea City Council approved a \$30,000 agreement with an engineering firm to design improvements to Snyder Fields. The City started making changes to the ballfields in 2022 for the first time in decades. Drainage was installed in 2022, with new fencing and dugouts in 2023. Now the City is considering improvements to the concession stand, bathrooms, walkways and parking area, along with a picnic area and playground. Some of the changes are needed to meet ADA requirements. The goal is to have plans ready for review by the Parks and Rec Board this spring. If the Council approves the plans, then the City would work with baseball and softball groups to raise funds this year with construction in 2026.

Update on developing the Union-Pacific rail to trail (one of the Board's top 5 priorities):: Also Jan. 13, the Albert Lea City Council voted to support a grant application by Freeborn County for funding toward the proposed trail along the former UP rail corridor. The city and county, with extensive public input, completed a Trail Action Plan in 2023 that envisions a 15-mile-long paved trail from Front Street in Albert Lea to Hartland. Freeborn County plans to apply for \$1 million grant from the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) to partially fund the first phase, which is 6.4 miles from Fountain Street to Manchester. MnDOT has \$12.5 million in Active Transportation fund available for infrastructure projects. The grants range from \$50,000 to \$1 million per project selected.

Go jump in the lake ... for a good cause! Mayor Rich Murray challenges community members to take part in the "Plunge for the Playground" fund-raiser for the All Together Inclusive Playground. Murray

plans to jump in Fountain Lake himself at the event, set for Saturday, Feb. 8, at 11 a.m. at the Edgewater Bay Pavilion, 1940 Edgewater Drive. While the playground equipment and rubberized surface have been installed, the All Together volunteer group is still raising money to complete the project. The playground, designed for people of all abilities, is set to open this spring on the west end of Edgewater Park. Teams can sign up on the All Together Facebook page.

Blazing Star State Trail: Ulland Brothers, the contractor hired by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, is progressing on extending the Blazing Star Trail from Myre-Big Island State Park to Hayward. The work includes a bridge over Albert Lea Lake. Trail users should be on the lookout for closures of a 1-mile segment from the park's visitor center heading east due to the construction. When completed in 2025, the trail will run between Frank Hall Park, 505 Frank Ave., in Albert Lea to Hayward. The project is funded by the Minnesota Environment and Natural Resources Trust fund, Federal Recreational Trail and Transportation Alternatives programs, 2020 state bonding, and the Parks and Trails Legacy Fund. Visit the trail webpage for future updates.

Senior Center: The Recreation Department and Albert Lea Family Y kicked off an evaluation of the Senior Center on Jan. 8 with several community partners and Senior Center members participating. We are following a process established by the National Council on Aging/Institute of Senior Centers. The process includes 9 standards, and project team will focus on all 9 standards over the next 7 months, including programming and location.

New stormwater project with trails: At its meeting Jan. 27, the Albert Lea City Council will vote on an engineering agreement to design a \$1 million stormwater project, funded mostly by a state grant. The project would consist of an extensive rain garden at 1300 Front Street with public trails for walking. The area is prone to flooding and the stormwater basins would help hold and filter stormwater. The city owns the project site and will use a Stormwater Resiliency Grant of \$886,000 to pay for most of the project.

New referee changing room: If visiting the City Arena, look for the new referee changing room in the skate-changing area outside the Nystrom Rink. Originally part of the referendum plans for the Arena, local companies built the room as a donation. Attig Construction, Geneva Lumber, Rink Systems and Albert Lea Electric donated supplies and services totaling around \$6,500 in value.
